Don't be afraid of them. My husband was always the pusher. You know, sometimes I would say, Oh, you know, I don't know if I want to do that. "No, we're doing it. Okay.

[5:11, narration] **G**: Jack, a lively man, loved interacting with people. Mary Ann recalls how he liked to sing.

[5:19] **M**: He loved to sing. He thought he had a great voice. At one time, he thought he was like María Alonso. He had a song that Phil Harris sang, *The Texas Ranger*.

[5:55] **M**: He would get up and sing it anywhere and I'd go, Sit down! Sit down! And that only encouraged him more.

[6:04, narration] G: Jack and Mary Ann liked to dance as well, especially to big band music.

[6:10] M: And my husband and my song—favorite song was In the Mood by Glenn Miller.

[6:42] M: So whenever we heard that, wherever we were, we got up and danced. It could be the middle of the street. Our son would get embarrassed if we got up and danced. We'd get up and dance in the living room if we heard a song, and of course he'd shrink in his chair, and no one else was around.

[7:07] G: Mary Ann says their favorite dance to do was the Lindy hop.

[7:11] **M**: When we were really young, he would pick me up and throw me this way and that way.

[7:20] G: Is the Lindy, like, very upbeat? Is it like...

[7:24] M: Yes. Did you ever see Dick Clark and the dance? That was a program on that came from Philadelphia and he always the top, you know, present singers on. And that was the theme song, was a Lindy.

[8:10, narration] **G**: It wasn't just Mary Ann and Jack who liked to dance. Their granddaughter, Nicole, who is now twenty-seven, danced for much of her life, thanks to Mary Ann.

[8:20] M: I got her into dance when she was three. She had to audition because Beverly who ran the studio didn't think—she really didn't like to take three year olds or under, but she listened,

Nicole, and followed whatever she was told. Yeah, she danced even in college. It was in her DNA! I don't know, I don't know. My son doesn't like to dance, so I don't know whether it just skipped a generation. At her age, I was married six years and had a child already— a different time, which was okay.
